This world shall perish in their hostility toward God as they stand ______ under His wrath upon them (Ephesians 2:3).

③ <u>H</u> Resource (6:7,9)

Like Philip, what we have at our human disposal is far less than _____.

Our resources simply lack when it comes to the matters that truly matter.

Andrew did not believe for one moment that something miraculous was about to transpire from such seemingly inadequate supplies.

Loaves of barley were considered an _____ bread.
